JOB OVERVIEW

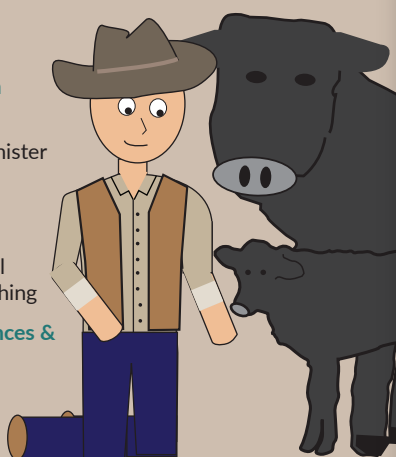
Manage the day-to-day farm operations of a ranch/farm

Identify sick animals & administer proper care and/or call the veterinarian

Manage breeding program including conducting artificial insemination; assist with birthing

Maintain wells, pipelines, fences & equipment

Transport animals to market

Large-scale ranches and farms; some may be independent producers & some may be corporate animal production

Monitor & move cattle around a feeding operation

Utilize a horse to ride through assigned pens daily and identify sick & in-distress animals; move accordingly to hospital pens

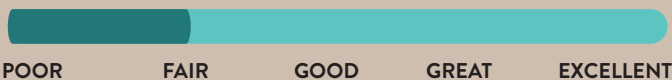
Assist in shipment of cattle as well as moving & weighing

Exercise safety & humane treatment of all animals at all times

Report pen problems & pen maintenance issues to supervisor

High school diploma & experience with horses & cattle; solid mathematics skills are also necessary

TYPICAL EMPLOYERS

Large livestock production companies and feedlots; some ranches may hire

JOB OVERVIEW

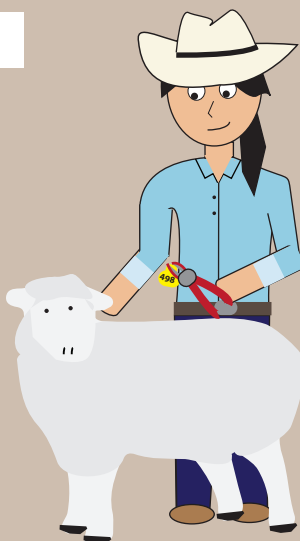
Oversee & maintain large herds of cattle or sheep on large land parcel

Ensure animals have access to water & food at all times

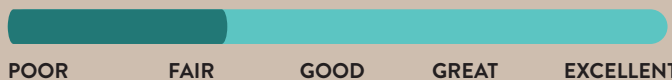
Identify sick animals & determine proper treatment or call vet

Assist in branding & tagging of animals; also oversee & administer vaccinations

Monitor & maintain grazing land, fencing, equipment, employees & records

EDUCATION NEEDED

High school diploma required; Associate's degree in animal science recommended

RECOMMENDED H.S. COURSES

Ag education, animal science, biology, anatomy, business courses, personal finance, mathematics

TYPICAL EMPLOYERS

Most are either self-employed, by ranch owners, or by large cattle feeding companies
