Attend auctions, farms or sales & bid on behalf of clients

Facilitate the process of purchasing horses including determining commission and establishing credit

Farrier

JOB OVERVIEW

Clean, trim & shoe horses' hooves

Observe hooves for signs of disease or poor health as well as lameness problems

Fabricate or purchase horseshoes to fit horses as requested by owner & tailored to horse's duties (riding, racing, working, etc.)

Remove old shoes & replace with new ones, either via hot or cold shoeing

Professionally groom pets & horses according to owner's instructions

Bathe & clean pets or horses prior to grooming

Brush & trim hair/fur, clean ears &

Recognize skin or coat issues as well as parasites, injury or disease symptoms to report

Clean tub or wash area as well as grooming supplies after each grooming
